## YEAR 13 STUDENT WINS PRESTIGIOUS SCHOLARSHIP



e were delighted to receive the news that Year 13 student Mandeep has won a full army officer scholarship to the prestigious Sandhurst Academy.

Here, Mandeep shares her experience with us:

"In February, I applied for an army officer scholarship after hearing about it at the EHS Careers Fair, although it was very different to anything I had done before. My application went through an extensive screening process over several months which involved lots of paperwork, interviews, testing and even a thorough army medical check in one of their barracks. I also had to start preparing for assessment tasks - which would involve both physical and written tests - which I would have to complete if I got through to the Army Officer Selection Board. The PE department were all very supportive throughout the process and helped me with my training.

"In April, I received the news that I would go through to the final stage of the application. This involved staying at Westbury for three days where I was put into a team, and completed a variety of different tests. The tests included essays, writing and discussing a planning exercise, command tasks (where I had to plan a route and lead my team across in good time), obstacle courses, more interviews and a bleep test. At the end, although I came out battered and bruised, and had even broken my glasses, I was proud of having survived it all and enjoyed the experience.

"The competition was extremely tough as there were many bright candidates with military backgrounds and experience already, and they were mostly male. However, a week later I was informed of the results, and I was shocked to learn that I had managed to obtain the full army scholarship, meaning that I have a place at Sandhurst Academy where I will undergo officer training as an army scholar after I have completed my degree at university." Congratulations, Mandeep, we are very proud of you!

# EHS PUPILS PERFORM MAHLER 8 'SYMPHONY OF A THOUSAND'

dgbaston High School's ambitious staging of Miss Saigon took place in November and has been a theatrical triumph. The cast and orchestra, numbering around one hundred people, dazzled sold out audiences with their polished and commanding performances, moving spectators to tears and leading to five consecutive standing ovations.

For the first time in a Senior School production, two students joined us from the Preparatory school (Jessie Xu and Zoe Shi) to play the part of Tam, the son of Kim and Chris. Kim and Chris, performed by Amara McCracken and Tommy Fauweather, took us on a breathtaking journey from delirious happiness to unbearable sorrow. The Engineer, played by Francesca Fernando, was witty and fresh and made light relief of some very moving scenes. Keerat Bharj, Fiona Mellor, Persia Shoja-Assadi and Isabella Birch gave impressive and moving performances of the characters Ellen and GiGi, while Jonathan Anderson and Tom Daniel made a huge impact in their respective roles as Jon and Thuy. The main characters were supported superbly by an excellent chorus and spectacular dance sequences which brought the full cast scenes to life.

Throughout the performances and during the rehearsal process all the performers relied on a massive team of students and staff back stage to help turn the exceptional singing and dancing into something that looked visually stunning. Many students assisted with stage management, ably directed by our Stage Manager, student Martha Howells. We were delighted to welcome a panel of well-known experts from a range of professional fields: Preet Gill MP, Councillor Alex Yip, (Conservative, Sutton Wylde Green), Councillor Nicky Brennan - (Lab, Sparkhill), Julie Brooks, Pharmaceutics, Formulation and Drug Delivery at Birmingham University and the Rt Rev Simon Heathfield, Archdeacon of Aston.

This year's event was superbly chaired by Year 13 Scholars

Davina and Mandeep, who did an impressive job of steering the debate. The panel were questioned by the students about the pressing issues of the day, including the environment, medical ethics, the inflammatory rhetoric used in politics, and of course, Brexit.

It was a morning of impassioned and, at times, heated debate between the Labour and Conservative representatives. There were also some excellent contributions from students from our visiting schools, Handsworth Grammar and St Paul's School for Girls. This was a valuable experience for all involved; certainly the thought-provoking matters were the subject of debate that carried on amongst students long into lunchtime and beyond.

# Passion and Inspiration at Edgbaston

s part of EHS STEAM Day, we were delighted to be joined by the inspirational Dr Anne-Marie Imafidon MBE. Dr Imafidon is the CEO of STEMettes, an award-winning social enterprise working to inspire and support young women into STEM careers. In her talk she encouraged EHS girls to pursue careers in STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Maths) and explored the range of opportunities available to them.

Year 9 pupils then spent the rest of our STEAM Day taking part in an engineering workshop with the Smallpeice Trust, in which they had to build their own wind turbines using every day materials. This was followed by a whole school 'STEMester'; a term of activities designed to enhance our pupils' learning in the areas of Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths through more hands on projects, problem-solving and industry-inspired workshops.





# LECTURES AND TALKS AT EHS

he EHS Academic Lecture Programme offers a broad range of thought-provoking talks from an eclectic mix of expert speakers and is an exciting opportunity to hear from some of the foremost thinkers in industry and business, science, the arts, the charity sector, and beyond.

Our first lecture of the year was taken by Professor Andrew Dove. Andrew is an award-winning professor of Chemistry who specialises in developing new Degradable Materials and Sustainable Polymers. He has studied and lectured at some of the best universities in the world, including Imperial College, London, and Stanford. He now leads a team of researchers at the University of Birmingham and his work in developing sustainable, environmentally friendly materials has earned him over 20 awards so far. His talk focussed on his current projects and some of their challenges.

> Our next lecture of the year was taken by Dr Shabbir Mohamed. Dr Mohamed is a leading ophthalmologist who specialises in treating many eye-related conditions such as cataracts, glaucoma, and ocular surface disease, among others. He is an innovator, developed creative ways of delivering care to his patients and carries out complex complex eye surgery and consultancy. Ophthamology is known for being an extremely challenging form of medicine, which requires many years of dedication and perseverance. Dr Mohamed shared his experiences of his work, including details of some of the more challenging procedures he has carried out, and provided practical advice for aspiring medics.

In November, we were joined by Prof. Sophie Hatchwell, Lecturer in Art History at Birmingham University. Her lecture gave an overview of French, Spanish and German speaking artists as well as cultural references which appear on the MFL exams syllabus. This was an excellent opportunity for girls in year 10 and above, which also built upon the Art History program for years 7, 8 & 9.

We have also been joined by EHS Old Girls, who have been keen to talk to our current students about their endevours. Sophie Barrett (EHS 2011) returned to school to talk to pupils about her career pathway to becoming an Artistic Director, working in the television and film industry. During her engaging talk, she spoke about the value of making and using connections to gain work experience in the field and was a fantastic example for the girls.

Another Old Girl, Nadia Ismail, joined us to give an inspirational speech about the challenges of a career in aviation.

The school was also delighted to welcome Tamara from Deep Mind, a subsidiary of Google, to talk to the students about digital intelligence, her career after graduating

with a degree in Computer Science and her current role as a software engineer. Tamara explained the history of digital intelligence and the role of women in a historically male-dominated industry. She had plenty of advice to offer regarding how to get started on this career path and the importance of work experience. This was followed later in the day by an informal Q and A session in which students had further discussions about the role and future of artificial intelligence, and the benefits of working in this industry.

We were also very lucky to be joined by Hamish Scott, artist at Birmingham Royal Ballet, who performed two short extracts from the ballet. The first, 'Jack in the Box' from Act one, was a powerful and energetic character dance showcasing the 'toy' brought to life by Drosselmeyer. The second demonstration was the Princes variation from Act two, this also demonstrated considerable athleticism while combining the elegance and artistry of the Prince character.

The pupils had a language taster session in either Arabic, Korean or Mandarin and took part in various language challenges in groups of six. These included giving a presentation in either French or German in front of a panel of judges, doing a code-breaking activity and inventing a board game linked to the work of GCHQ also in either French or German.

The girls all had a wonderful day and were challenged to step outside their comfort zone by the different activities. The two EHS teams both worked extremely hard on their challenges and came up with some original and inventive ideas. We were delighted when, at the end of the day, it was announced that our French team had won overall. The girls were awarded some fantastic prizes, including a GCHQ puzzle book signed by the director of GCHQ and a trip to Bletchley Park.

Following two months of rehearsals, twenty Year 10 GCSE
Drama students performed a unique adaptation of Shakespeare's 'Julius Caesar' at the Midlands Arts Centre as part of the Shakespeare Schools Festival.

The festival is a national event that encourages young people to take ownership of one play and to own both the language and staging of what can feel, at first, a difficult obstacle.

The students were given the opportunity to put forward their own ideas in relation to both how the play would sound as well as look. In true EHS spirit, the girls rose to the challenge with well-choreographed physical sequences as well as handling the complex choral speaking moments.

As well as performing at the Festival, the girls took part in a preparation workshop where they paired up with a local primary school, being facilitated by the Shakespeare Foundation to act as mentor and role model with the younger performers. This was extended to the performance night, being paired with another primary school to support their performances of The Tempest and Hamlet.

For some of us, some of the simplest staging moments can often be the most striking and effective. The Shakespeare Schools Foundation and members of the audience commented that two moments would 'stick in my mind for some time'; the unique use of ribbon to create Caesar's demise and the final moment where the two classes became a theatrical ensemble in the true sense of the word.

# Working Together: Miss Saigon Workshop

# REMEMBERING AN EHS OLD GIRL: PIONEER, SUFFRAGETTE, CAMPAIGNER

r. Mary Darby Sturge, a former pupil at Edgbaston High School for Girls, was a pioneering campaigner who worked tirelessly for Birmingham and the local community.

Mary was in the first intake at Edgbaston High School for Girls but, as a woman, she was refused entry to the Medical School at Birmingham so instead studied at London School of Medicine. In 1895 she returned to Birmingham as only the second qualified woman doctor in the city and worked as an anaesthetist at the Birmingham and Midland Hospital for Women. There she met Professor John Taylor, a gynaecologist, after whom she named the Taylor Memorial Home which she helped found in 1910.

The Taylor Memorial Home was initially based in Sparkhill and provided end of life care for women suffering from gynaecological cancers. It was not until the 1970s, long after the home had moved to Erdington at the end of the Second World War, that men and people with non-cancer related terminal illnesses were admitted for care. The home became known as John Taylor Hospice in the early 1990s and launched community care, ensuring nurses could visit patients at home.

Mary was a member of the Management Committee for the Home from 1910 until her death in 1925. She supported many charitable causes but 'the one to which she was most devoted was undoubtedly the Taylor Memorial Home. From its inception she was its





enthusiastic supporter and helper.' (1924 Annual Report).

Mary was an innovator in so many ways. In 1923 she set up a pension fund for the home's nurses and, as the first President of the Medical Women's Federation (1920-1922), Mary campaigned for equal pay for women and for the removal of the marriage bar for women in medicine. She was also a member of the Birmingham Women's Suffrage Society.

Mary was kind and generous, especially towards her poorer patients to whom she would literally give the clothes off her back and the food from her table. Her generosity is still reflected in the charity she helped found. Today John Taylor Hospice provides care for hundreds of people at the end of their lives and its motto is every moment matters.

This is a special year for John Taylor Hospice as it celebrates its 110th anniversary with a host of events including a Secret Garden Ball, summer fayre and the Sunset Walk.

#### Musician of the Year

# SHEAU-EN WINS GOLD


ear 9 pupil Sheau-En competed in the Skate Southern Club International at Lee Valley Ice Centre, London.
