CHOOSING YOUR FUTURE

Degrees and Apprenticeships

Starting Year 12 might make leaving Sixth Form feel like it's far off, but it's never too early to start thinking about what comes next. Once you've finished your A Levels, you'll have lots of options for your future and your career. Here are some pathways you can explore:


Degree

A degree is a qualification you get from a university or college to show you've completed a course or reached a certain level of academic achievement. When you pursue a degree, you get to dive deep into a subject you're passionate about over three or four years. It gives you the knowledge and skills needed for specific careers and can help set you up for a job you'll love.

How to Pick the Right Degree

- Think about what you enjoy Could your favourite subjects or hobbies turn into a career?
- Explore job sites and look at graduate career options. This will give you a sense of what jobs are out there and what qualifications they need.
- Set your career goals What jobs are you aiming for? Check what qualifications or skills are needed.
- Check UCAS subject guides (see link in resources). They'll help you see what you can study and where these subjects can lead you.

Degree Apprenticeships: A Different Path

If you'd rather jump straight into work while still getting a degree, a degree apprenticeship could be for you. It takes three to six years to complete (depending on the level) and lets you earn a salary while learning.

How it works

- You spend 80% of your time working and 20% studying. That could mean going to university one or two days a week, or in short bursts (like a week at a time).
- · You can earn between £15,000 and £20,000 a year while gaining real-world experience in your chosen industry.
- · There's no strict application cycle like with uni. Apprenticeships pop up all year round, so you have to keep an eye on vacancies.

You can apply to university and for degree apprenticeships at the same time to keep your options open.

Top Tips

- Choose a uni where both the course and city vibe suit vou.
- Work experience is a great way to boost your chances for a degree or apprenticeship.
- Reach out to local businesses or ask family and friends for opportunities. You can also use Springpod, an online platform for virtual work experience with top employers.
- Attending lunchtime career talks is another way to explore your options. Our school offers many, so don't miss out!
- · Both work experience and career talks will strengthen your CV and personal statement.

Pros of a degree apprenticeship

- ✓ You'll get real life experience working alongside your degree.
- ✓ Your degree is fully paid for, so there's no cost to you.
- ✓ You'll get paid a salary just like a normal employee.

Cons of a degree apprenticeship

- ✗ You'll need to balance working and studying at the same time.
- X You won't qualify for any student loans.
- Apprentices don't always get the traditional 'university experience'.


