

Prevent Policy

Rationale

The National Prevent Strategy aims to stop people becoming terrorists or supporting terrorism. Edgbaston High School, working with other local partners, families and communities, seeks to play a key role in ensuring that the children and young people who attend the school/settings or make use of the school and its facilities are safe from the threat of terrorism.

The Prevent strategy identifies that young people are more likely to be vulnerable to violent extremist or terrorist narratives, including non-violent extremism, which can create an atmosphere conducive to terrorism and can popularise views which terrorists exploit. The Government's Prevent Strategy defines extremism as 'Vocal or active opposition to fundamental British values, including democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty and mutual respect and tolerance of different faiths and beliefs'.

Objectives

- To tackle the ideological causes that lead to radicalisation by early intervention and support
- To respect learner and staff diversity, encouraging freedom and openness.
- To assess the risk of pupils, whether in school and its immediate facilities or engaged in school related activities off site, being drawn to terrorism.
- To train all staff so that they have the knowledge and confidence to identify children at risk of being drawn into terrorism, and to challenge extremist ideas which can be used to legitimise terrorism.
- To ensure that children are safe from terrorist and extremist material when in school.
- To ensure that the Prevent Action Plan is always fit for purpose. See appendix 1

Success Criteria

- Edgbaston High School continues to be a safe place where children and young people can understand and discuss sensitive topics, including terrorism and the extremist ideas that are part of the terrorist ideology, and learn how to challenge such ideas.
- The early identification and intervention of those who are susceptible to radicalisation
- Fundamental British Values promoted (many of which have always underpinned our school's ethos), including mutual respect, tolerance and democratic participation.
- Robust safeguarding policies in place which take into account the policies and procedures set
 out by Birmingham Safeguarding Children Partnership and identify extremism/radicalisation
 as issues to be reported promptly to the Designated Safeguarding/Prevent lead.

Methodology

1. Implementation

Prevent has introduced a simple yet effective procedure for addressing concerns about someone getting involved in terrorism: Notice, Check, Share.

Notice:

ALL staff are encouraged to observe for signs such as advocating extremist messages or refusing to listen to different points of view.

Identify possible Indicators of Risk

- Racist graffiti/ symbols/ comments made in School.
- Speaking out or writing in favour of extremist ideas in school work.
- Extreme comments shared on social media.
- Distribution of extreme or terrorist propaganda among other pupils.
- Vulnerable students being influenced by others (although we are aware of a need to avoid over-simplified assessments of who might be 'vulnerable'), because of the existence of one or more factors, which may include:
 - An identity crisis, involving an individual's distance from their cultural/ religious heritage, including peer/family/faith group rejection.
 - O A personal crisis, including family tension/social isolation/friendship issues.
 - O Personal circumstances, such as migration, experience of racism.
 - Unmet aspirations.
 - o Criminality.
 - Experience of poverty, disadvantage, discrimination or social exclusion.
- Association with those known to be involved in extremism (including via the internet).
- A significant shift in the child/ young person's behaviour or outward appearance,
 particularly involving conflict with her family and/or faith group.
- Travel for extended periods of time to international locations known to be associated with extremism.
- Disguising of a child's identity, eg in documentation.
- A simplistic or flawed understanding of religious/ political/ global issues.
- A significant adult or other in the child/ young person's life who has extremist views or sympathies.
- Critical risk factors, being:
 - Contact with extremist recruiters.
 - Articulation of support for extremist causes/ leaders.
 - The possession of extremist literature.
 - Using extremist narratives and a global ideology to explain personal disadvantage.
 - Justifying the use of violence to solve societal issues.
 - Membership of extremist organisations.

CHECK

Those working closely with young people are well-placed to notice changes in behaviour. If you think a child or young person might be at risk of being radicalised into terrorism, you should share your concerns with the designated safeguarding lead (DSL).

Ask yourself or a colleague:

- Is there an alternative explanation?
- Has there been a change of circumstances at home?
- Are your colleagues seeing these behaviours?

SHARE

In the event of a concern, staff should follow standard safeguarding procedures and share their concerns with the DSL. The DSL, in turn, should be familiar with local procedures for making a Prevent referral. Remember to share information early to help reduce risk and get support for the young person if needed.

The school uses the Birmingham City Council Prevent Screening Tool if there are any concerns with a child at the school in relation to Prevent.

Education

The school has a comprehensive PSHEE programme that allows pupils a safe place within which they can understand and discuss sensitive topics, including terrorism and the extremist ideas that are part of the terrorist ideology, and learn how to challenge such ideas. Other subject areas, such as Religious Education also address these issues, as do assemblies.

Training and Checks on visitors

There is a designated safeguarding lead in all sections of the school, as well as a Governor Representative. **Appendix 2.** Training needs are identified by all, but the Deputy Head Pastoral in the Senior School, who is a DSL, leads the whole school training on Prevent.

It is the responsibility of all members of staff to ensure that all people who visit the school site are checked in relation to Prevent. This will include;

- due diligence checks on groups/ individuals seeking to hire or use school premises,
- due diligence checks on visitors to school, particularly visiting speakers, whether invited by children or staff and ensure speakers are accompanied at all times,
- due diligence checks on contractors working on the school sites.

Supportive Interventions

- Channel is the multi-agency approach to protect people at risk from radicalisation and aims to identify individuals at risk of being drawn into terrorism, assess the nature and extent of that risk, inform the Deputy Head Pastoral in the senior school, who is the DSL with responsibility for Prevent and develop the most appropriate support plan for the individuals concerned.

2. Monitoring

- Any identified risk factors will be reported on My Concern.
- The Deputy Head Pastoral will also use Smoothwall to track any internet activity that might cause concern. This will also be documented in My Concern
- All staff training will be maintained, and any updates communicated via the safeguarding updates in staff briefings/meetings

Evaluation and Review

This policy is evaluated after any incident involving the Birmingham City Council Prevent screening tool and is reviewed every two years regardless of any incident. Safeguarding updates are monitored by the DSL and the Safeguarding Policy are updated annually. Governors are also made aware of any updates relating to safeguarding, including Prevent.
